Anti-Racism Committee Pilgrimage Trip Reflection

On March 17, I, along with 29 other members of the Sheppard's and Lapsley Presbytery, participated in a three-day trip sponsored by the Anti-Racism Committee that took us to Birmingham, then to Selma, and finally to Montgomery. The trip was designed to immerse the participants into the history of the Civil Rights Movement within our Presbytery.

The agenda included visits to the 16th street Baptist Church, the Birmingham Civil Rights Museum, the Montgomery Bus Riot Museum, and the Equal Justice Institute. We also participated in a Selma Racism Workshop and a walk across the Edmund Pettus Bridge. After each of the daily activities the participants then engaged in wonderful conversations about what we had seen and how it made us feel. We heard from our colleagues of all colors and backgrounds and had rich discussions about what we saw and what our Christian response should be. Ultimately, we made lots of progress towards our goal in the Anti-Racism Committee, which is using the Gospel definition of 'neighbor' to become better equipped to meet Christ's call to love our neighbors as ourselves.

Personally, the topic of racism stirs up several difficult emotions. Accordingly, this makes it a delicate subject to address. And that makes sense, right? Racism and the unjust, oppressive, and violent treatment of many African Americans in the history of our country is not something we are proud of and is very uncomfortable to discuss. Yet, it is vital to healing the wounds created by our history that we first look at each other as neighbors – regardless of where we live or what color we are. As Christ indicated in the parable of the Good Samaritan, EVERYONE is our neighbor if we call ourselves Christians. And, then Christ clearly calls us to go out and love those neighbors.

With this logic in mind and with a heart engaged in working towards healing, I am heavily convicted on how we at MBPC can love our neighbors who may not look like us or who may come from different backgrounds. I want to emphasize the call to LOVE . . . this does not include weighing yourself down with guilt, shaming others, or ignoring the issue altogether. The love we are called to give is the highest level of love humans can offer. It is helpful when thinking about how we should love our neighbor to not gloss over the qualifying phrase in Luke 10:27 (the introductory verse to the parable of the Good Samaritan). In this verse Jesus calls us to love your neighbor as yourself. This is not a casual, one-time only type of love – this is a daily, life-giving love equal to how much we love ourselves.

Moving forward, my hope is that we can create a forum for open conversation about the issue of racism and its effect on our neighbors. I am open to any ideas about how we can do this with a spirit of respect, courage, compassion and of course, love.

So, to all of you in the MBPC community, let us faithfully lead the charge in loving our neighbors – all of them. And in leading this charge, let us lead with love!





Miles College Choir Sunday - February 27, 2022



As we approach Holy Week and the promise of Easter, Christ's commandment for us to love one another becomes more and more pervasive in our readings, and is even the primary focus for our Maundy Thursday service of Communion. Maundy means "mandate", commandment, if you will.

This morning, before sitting down to make commentary on the events of Miles College Sunday my reading in Johns Gospel is leading up to the arrest of Jesus as he is readying the disciples for the upheaval that is about to come in their journey with Jesus. He is trying to assure them that He and the Father are one; that to know Him is to know the Father; that his coming sacrifice and passion for the world will usher in the Spirit and that through the spirit we will be with Jesus and the Father; as part of a vine, and to insure healthy growth and the bearing of fruit we must dwell with Jesus in His word and through the actions in our daily life.

John 15:12: This is my commandment, that you love on another as I have loved you. You are my friends if you do whatever I command you. No longer do I call you servants, for a servant does not know what his master is doing; but I have called you friends, for all things that I heard from My Father I have made known to you. You did not choose me, but I chose you and appointed you that you should go and bear fruit, and that your fruit should remain, that whatever you ask the Father in My name He may give you. Harris and her many contributions to our worship over the decades. Also, our children's choir director Allison Sanders, is teaching voice at Miles. You may have met Feordis Pearson, who is a recent graduate of Miles and now sings with our choir each Sunday. This is God pruning and tending the vine of which we a grafted in. We have no way of knowing the ways our lives help to bring about fruit, or even exactly what that fruit may be, but we do know that fruit of our living and service ultimately glorifies God. This gives us joy.

Miles College Sunday is set next year is February 26 (fourth Sunday in February). As we move through the coming year, be thinking and praying about and for Miles College Choir. Imagine ways you can help to tend this branch of the vine through you membership or relationship with MBPC, and think and pray about other organic communities our church touches, and the potential for a congregation to change the world through our service, our dwelling in Christ, and through our love for others. I pray that God feeds us with the Spirit, and increases our joy in faithful service.







So let's make the most of this beautiful day;




